4. FIRST AID

General Information

Exposure

Swallowed

Do NOT induce vomiting. Give a glass of water to drink. Call a POISON CENTER or doctor/physician if you feel unwell.

Eye contact

IF IN EYES: Rinse cautiously with water for several minutes. Remove contact lenses, if present and easy to do. Apply continuous irrigation with water for at least 15 minutes holding eyelids apart. If eye irritation persists: Get medical advice.

Skin contact

IF ON SKIN: Wash with plenty of soap and water. If skin irritation or rash occurs: get medical advice/attention. Take off contaminated clothing and wash before re-use.

Inhaled

Generally, inhalation of fumes is unlikely to result in adverse health effects. If coughing, dizziness or shortness of breath is experienced, remove the patient to fresh air immediately. If patient is unconscious, place in the recovery position (on the side) for transport and contact a doctor. Call a POISON CENTER or doctor/physician if you feel unwell.

Injected

If accidental self-injection occurs, call a doctor immediately.

5. FIREFIGHTING MEASURES

Fire and explosion hazards:	There are no specific risks for fire/explosion for this chemical. It is classed as non-flammable. This substance can burn in a fire.
Suitable extinguishing substances:	Carbon dioxide, extinguishing powder, foam.
Unsuitable extinguishing substances:	Unknown.
Products of combustion:	Carbon dioxide, and if combustion is incomplete, carbon monoxide and smoke. Water. May form toxic mixtures in air and may accumulate in sumps, pits and other low-lying spaces, forming potentially explosive mixtures.
Protective equipment:	Self-contained breathing apparatus. Safety boots, non-flammable overalls, gloves, hat and eye protection.

6. ACCIDENTAL RELEASE MEASURES

Containment	If greater than 1000L is stored, secondary containment and emergency plans to manage any potential spills must be in place. In all cases design storage to prevent discharge to stormwater.
Emergency procedures	In the event of a large spillage (>100L) alert the fire brigade to location and give brief description of hazard. Stop the source of the leak, if safe to do so. Wear protective equipment to prevent skin, eye and respiratory exposure. Clear area of any unprotected personnel. Contain using sand, earth or vermiculite. Prevent by whatever means possible any spillage from entering drains, sewers, or water courses. (If this occurs contact your regional council immediately).
Clean-up method	Use absorbent (soil, sand or other inert material). Rags are not recommended for the clean-up of spills, as they may create fire or environmental hazard. Collect and seal in properly labelled containers or drums for disposal. If contamination of crops, sewers or waterways has occurred advise local emergency services.
Disposal	Mop up and collect recoverable material into labelled containers for recycling or salvage. Recycle containers wherever possible. This material may be suitable for approved landfill. Dispose of only in accord with all regulations.

Engineering Controls

Summary

IF SWALLOWED: May be harmful if swallowed in large quantity or if allergy to iodine or peanut oil is present.

IF IN EYES: contact may cause irritation.

IF ON SKIN: may cause mild skin irritation and oily skin. A skin reaction to iodine may appear as hives, itching or a rash.

IF INHALED: may be harmful if inhaled.

IF INJECTED: Iodine may result in allergic reaction, with symptoms of laboured breathing, swelling of the tongue and throat, nausea, flushing, fever, rapid heartbeat, loss of consciousness. Death.

CHRONIC: Iodine may cause hyperthyroidism. Allergic reaction to peanut oil may occur to those predisposed to it.
